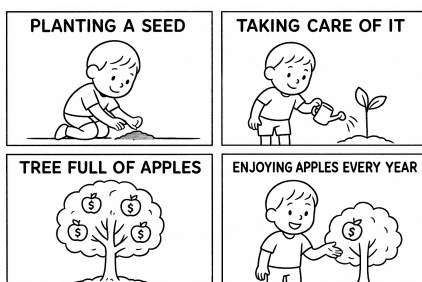

If you plant and take care of it, even a small seed can grow into a tree full of apples that feeds you every year.

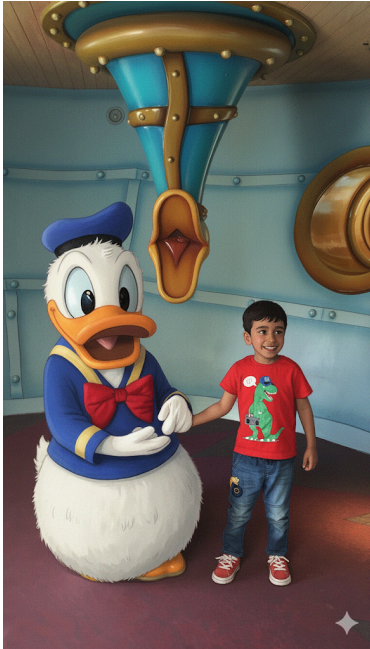

SPOTLIGHT STOCK IN DETAIL: WALT DISNEY COMPANY

Stock Symbol: DIS - The code used in place of the whole name. Think "Bro" instead of Brother

Stock Exchange: NYSE - The place where the stock is brought and sold (traded). There are multiple stock exchanges around the world. Not every stock is sold everywhere.

Market Cap: 206.38B - The total price if you bought every single share of the company. Like the company's price tag in the store.

52 week high / low : \$124.69 / \$80.10 - **Price:** \$115.48

The highest and lowest price of the stock in a year that helps investors determine today's price compares.
